
## Old Settlers Picnic Set For Saturday, Sept. 4 In Alex

In 1907 Julius M. Forthun came to the community of Alexander with his mother, two brothers and two sisters from Cummings, N. Dak. His plans were to help his mother build a homestead and farm, then to return to the eastern part of the state where he had attended school and helped his mother run a General Store. His father was killed when Julius was only nine years old. This happened as he was moving to Bottineau county to homestead and to start another store.

The western plains got into Julius' blood and he proceeded to file a claim on a homestead in the spring of 1910.

Julius loved to eat and when he met a young lady, Miss Slagle of Ravenwood, Mo., she soon discovered this weakness and put out many meals of delicious southern fried chicken, golden corn bread, baking powder biscuits and gravy. Thus a romance started. They were married in Williston on March 18,

Mrs. Forthun came to the Alexander community in 1910 to visit with her sister and family, Mrs. Jim Soward of Shafer. Her brother, Rorse Slagle lived on a homestead near Alexander and Golda spent some time with him

homestead near Alexander and Golda spent some time with him also. It was then she decided to file a claim on a homestead. While she was living here a steam shovel was moved by its own power, on rail, from Baker's Ferry across her land on the Old farming it. Ferry across her land on the Old X Trail, to Rawson to build the railroad. The only means of travel for people in the community at that time was by stone boat or horseback boat or horseback.

Both Mr. and Mrs. Forthun have been active in their community. Mr. Forthun served 20 years on the school board in Alexander, along with Julius Jacobson, E. Toenburg, B. C. Moses, S. E. Ensor, J. H. Fallon, Dr. Rogers, Paul Wold, F. K.
